artist deserves. Jones (1895–1974) was a painter, a wood- and copper-engraver and maker of painted inscriptions, but it was as a poet that he left his most lasting mark. Eliot called him "one of the most distinguished writers of my generation" and Dylan Thomas said he "would like to have done anything as good as David Jones has done." Auden praised his poem *In Parenthesis* as "the greatest book [ever] about the Great War", and *The Anathemata* as one of the "truly great poems in Western Literature." His work, the whole of it, enables him to stand alongside Eliot, Pound, and James Joyce as an incomparable figure in literary Modernism.

David Jones is regarded by many to be one of the great writers of the modern age. T.S. Eliot called "*In Parenthesis*" "a work of genius" and W.H. Auden wrote that "*The Anathemata*" "is probably the finest long poem written in English in this century". In addition to generous selections from these two book-length poems, this volume includes "*The Tribune's Visitation*", "*The Tutelar of the Place*", "*The Hunt*", and an except from the title poem from "*The Sleeping Lord*", the books Jones published shortly before his death.

Through a selection of letters to friends and literary peers, *Dai Greatcoat* presents a rare insight into the life of the poet and artist David Jones and in so doing offers an autobiographical portrait of the author in his own words.

The great modernist artist and poet David Jones grew up in Brockley, London. He finished art school in the summer of 1913, ready to pursue a career as an artist. But then Britain declared war on Germany, and Jones joined the army. He was sent to France in 1915, serving in the same regiment as Siegfried Sassoon and Wilfred Owen; unlike them, however, he was a private, a rank he kept throughout the war. He fought in and survived the Somme, Ypres, and Passchendaele, experiencing the war of the common soldier - the camaraderie, the humor, the grief, and above all the senseless, mechanized brutality - all under the stress of years of relentless artillery fire.
